ROCCO'S READING SUCCESS STORY

HOW BEN'S SUMMER LEARNING PROGRAMME IS USING THE CAMP ENVIRONMENT TO CREATE A LOVE OF READING.

Eight-year-old St George's Prep student, Rocco Rodday, is not a fan of reading. In fact, his mother, Kelly, says he not only "absolutely hates it" but he is also "quite vocal" about it. He would much rather be fishing or playing Pokémon!

The format of the three-week Bermuda Education Network's (BEN) Horizon's summer reading programme, however, proved ideal for him.

For the past two years, Rocco had been reading below grade level, but by the Spring he had improved considerably and was "approaching grade level", meaning he was only about six months behind where a typical P3 student should be.

This improvement, says Kelly, was down to the dedication of Rocco's school reading teacher, Natalie Roberts, who was a huge factor in his success. But then the long summer holidays came along.

A primary school teacher herself, Kelly says she often has students who she wishes she had another month with. This was the case with Rocco. He just needed that little bit more and that's where the summer reading programme came in.

Sneaking a reading programme into a fun, camp environment worked wonders for Rocco, who was particularly excited to be doing it with a good friend as well. Reading was mixed with art lessons from Kaleidoscope and marine science experiences from BUEI. The marine science experiences turned out to be his favourite and he particularly enjoyed the glass bottom boat ride and making his own fossil.

Without the summer reading programme, which is provided by BEN free of charge, parents might have to resort to hiring tutors to help with their child's reading over the summer. This is expensive and often a major obstacle for parents.

It provides an excellent enhancement to the public-school curriculum, and Kelly was so impressed with BEN's dedication to support public school students and their teachers that she began working for them as the P3 teacher representative. She also became camp director this summer.

In September, Rocco was able to begin the current school year reading at grade level and who knows, maybe one day he will choose to read a book while waiting for a fish to bite.

COMMITTING TO THE COMMUNITY FORTITUDE RE



Through building up the network of teachers and connecting them with community partners and advocates, BEN is looking to increase the opportunities and services available to public-school children.

Fortitude Re CRO, Andrew Sooboodoo, recalled the stress his mother felt working at a school for children with severe educational needs in the UK.

"Fortitude was looking for a way to support the cause. They felt that the people who work at BEN came across as not just passionate but experienced and knowledgeable."



A teacher's job is rewarding but arduous. BEN's Outstanding Teacher Awards are an incredible way to recognize the excellent work that is happening, up the standard of teaching and possibly prevent teacher burnout in the public system. A teacher's wellness is at the helm of good quality education.

Since starting the relationship, Fortitude has taken every opportunity for community involvement. For the next six months, employees have committed to reading at the BEN Book Club — an interactive public preschool story time. Staff have been excited to get involved and help inspire children to enjoy reading. Some are taking their own children along to this monthly event.

Fortitude Re now has a seat at the table and a space to give their opinion and help drive impact. They were able to help identify some administrative blocks and have donated expertise that will build a tool to allow for more efficient and accurate data reporting for its various programs. That day, the presentation ended with a quote that stuck in the hearts of Fortitude employees: "At first you learn to read, then you read to learn". Investing resources to help children that have fallen behind at this crucial stage could help in all aspects of their future, especially those that want to get into the insurance industry.



MAKING HER WAY

HOW LATOYA PEARMAN WENT FROM EDUCATION ADVOCATE TO BEN PROGRAM COORDINATOR



Latoya Pearman, busy mother-of-three to 13-, 11- and eight-year-old children, re-entered the workforce in April, to manage logistics for the Bermuda Education Network's (BEN) Horizons Programme.

A passionate advocate for Bermuda's public schools, Latoya accepted the offer after seeing how much her own daughter had enjoyed and learned from the programme.

But that wasn't the only reason.

Not all children in Bermuda have the opportunity to visit cultural, historical or thought-provoking places such as BUEI, the Kaleidoscope Arts Foundation, National Trust properties, or the Aquarium. She believes that they should.

Her own children attend Purvis Primary and the Whitney Institute Middle School and her oldest daughter will start at the Berkeley Institute in September, something Latoya is very excited about. As an alumna herself, she appreciates the institution's history, what it means to Bermuda and what it has done for Bermuda.

The majority of our island's Bermudian students are in the public school system and she sees so many children coming out doing brilliant work thanks to amazing teachers, yet this excellence is not being celebrated.

"She also believes as a community, Bermuda needs to do more to support the island's public schools, and the disparity between public perception and actual reality concerns her."

This is why she does what she does. She wants to be part of the transformation process and she has done this by throwing herself into her new role as Horizons Coordinator so she can give every public-school student the same exposure she strives to give her own children.

Resuming expeditions was, however, a baptism of fire! So many children, including Latoya's own son and daughter, missed out on these over the last couple of years and she was excited to get students and teachers out of the classroom and back out into the community.

Just over 100 expeditions were arranged once regulations were relaxed to allow field trips in April, and most of them were sell-outs within 24 hours of being announced.

Horizons focuses on experiential learning or learning by doing. All expeditions are developed to support the curriculum, but every now and then an unusual opportunity comes along. This year it was to see the yachts from the Clipper Round the World Race. The students were amazed at their size and couldn't believe how far they had travelled.

Hands-on experiences such as steering a clipper, experiencing the beauty and biodiversity of Spittal Pond, stepping back in time to learn about the people who lived in Bermuda in the 18th century at Verdmont Museum, allows students to better connect theories learned in the classroom to the real world.


