Voices from the Ship: Pick a Purpose



Today we are going to learn how to write about HMS Pickle in different ways. We will focus on *how we write the information, what layout we use, and who our reader is.*

Remember the HMS Pickle was a small Bermuda-built sloop, but it played a very big role in history. After the Battle of Trafalgar in 1805, Admiral Nelson's most famous victory. Pickle was the ship chosen to carry the news all the way back to England. This ship raced across the Atlantic to deliver the message that Britain had won. Without HMS Pickle, the people in London might not have known about the victory for weeks!

For Bermuda, this was important too. Bermuda is a *maritime* nation — that means life on the island is closely linked to the sea, with sailors, shipbuilders, and fishing. Because Bermuda built fast, strong ships like Pickle, the island gained recognition and pride for its sailors and shipbuilders.

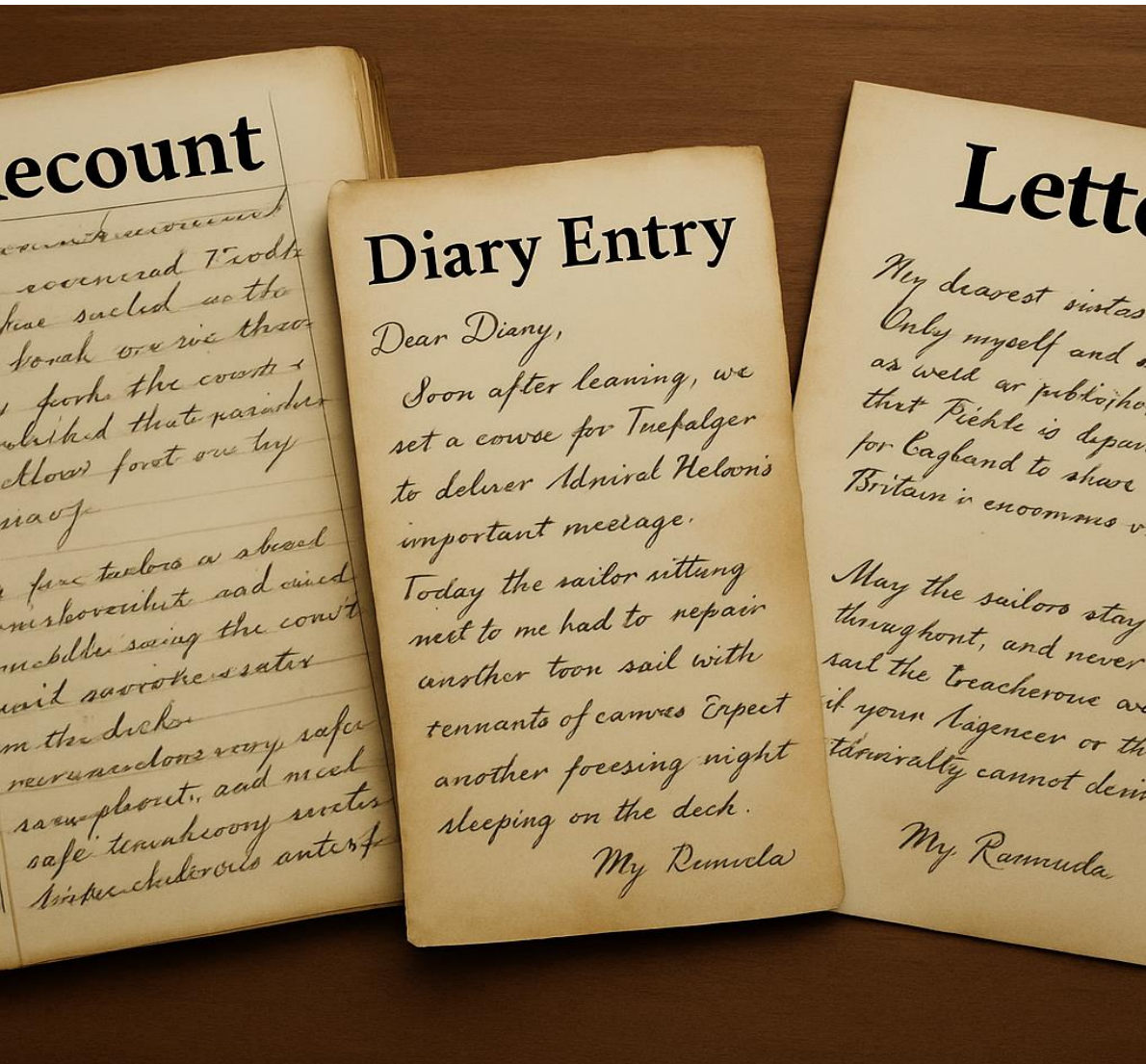

Turn to your partner and discuss:

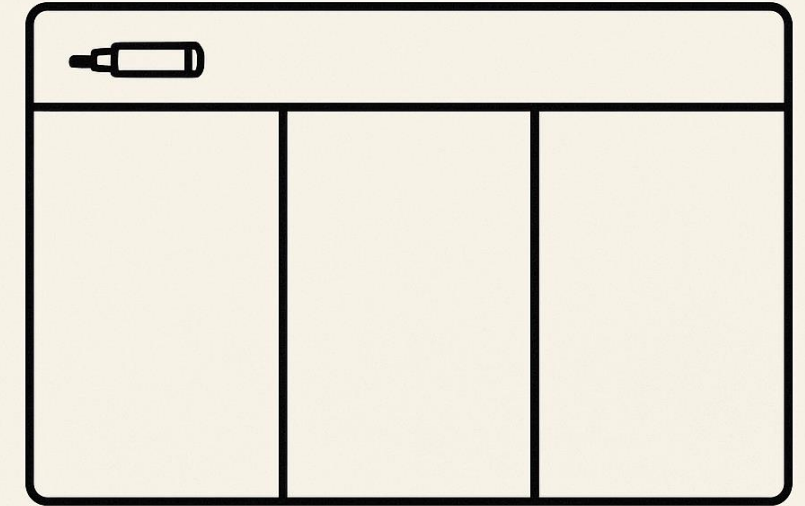
- Why do you think sailors needed to keep a factual recount or diary? What is the difference?
- If you were a sailor, which kind of writing would you enjoy most – diary writing, letters, or factual reports? Why?
- What kind of writing would be most useful to the captain?
- What kind of writing would be most useful to the sailor's family?
- Which kind of writing do you think sailors would find boring or more interesting to write?
- Which kind of writing might make sailors feel proud or important?
- Which kind of writing would you find hardest? Why?

Group work: *How do Factual Recounts, Diaries, and Letters look different?*

- We are going to do some group work now.
Each group will use a whiteboard and divide it into **three columns**.
- We are focusing on the three genres of writing:
 1. Diary Entry
 2. Letter
 3. Factual Recount
- In each column, write down the **techniques and features** for that type of writing. Think about:
 - How is it structured?
 - What makes it different from the other two?
 -  **Remember:** All three tell a story, but they *sound* different depending on **who is writing** and **who is reading**.

How do Factual Recounts, Diaries, and Letters look different?

Recount of the Voyage

22nd July, 1796

We departed Port Royal, Jamaica, on the 10th of July, 1796, with a cargo of sugar and spices bound for Barbados. The weather at departure was calm, and the ship made steady progress eastward.

From the 10th to the 13th, conditions remained favourable. On the 14th of July, we encountered a heavy storm near Hispaniola. Strong winds and heavy rain required the crew to reef the sails. Some water entered the lower deck, but no damage was sustained, and the ship remained sound.

Following the storm, the weather cleared, and sailing was steady. Marine life, including dolphins and flying fish, was observed alongside the vessel. Provisions were checked daily and remained sufficient.

On the 19th of July, the ship anchored briefly off St. Lucia to replenish fresh water supplies. Departure was prompt, and by the 21st of July, the coastline of Barbados was sighted.

- 💡 **Tip: Remember...**
- Recount = events in order.
- Diary = feelings in first person.
- Letter = written to someone.

Write in your chosen genre of writing.

-  **Remember While You Write!**
-  **Diary Entry** → Start with date and time, "Dear Diary", use *I / me*, and share feelings, write in past tense "I saw",
-  **Informal Letter Home** → Greeting, address, date at the top, chatty opening, personal tone, first person (*I, me, my*), sharing news or events, including feelings or opinions, asking questions, simple friendly sentences, closing line (*From, Yours, Love*), signature.
-  **Factual Recount** → Tell events in **order**, use **past tense**, and stick to **facts**.

Spelling station

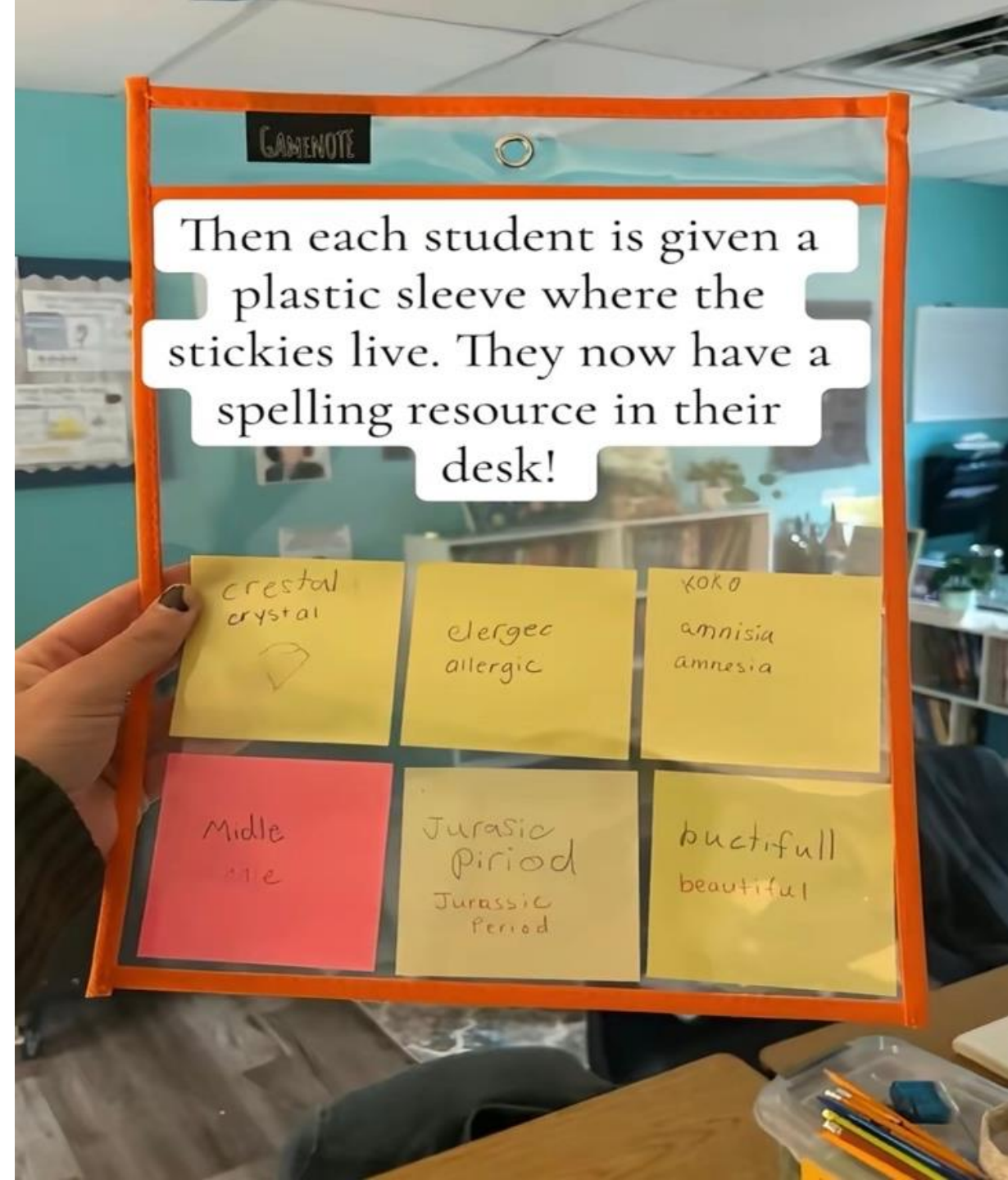
Look back at your writing...
